Chairman Ghanbari and members of the House Armed Services and Veterans Affairs Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to speak with you today in support of House Bill 190, the Ohio Veterans' Heritage Protection Act. This bill proposes to better protect war relics such as Civil War cannons and similar relics located on public property from being sold, destroyed, relocated, removed, altered or disturbed, except as described in this legislation.

I want to thank Representatives Tim Ginter and Adam Miller for addressing this issue and I know they did a great job describing in Committee last week the challenges that sometimes arise when private collectors come calling to offer cash-strapped local governments or cemetery associations cash for these illegal transactions. These relics are not just a tangible part of American history; they are most often federal property.

We have probably all seen these cannons or perhaps some WWII anti-tank guns on display in front of our county courthouses, city halls, cemeteries or other public grounds. With adequate protections, these are proper ways to share this history with the public. If they are not on display in those public spaces, publically accessible museums and historic sites are where these relics (museums often refer to them as collections) of local, state and national history belong.

The Ohio History Connection commends Reps. Ginter and Miller as well as Sen. Schaffer on the Senate side for working on this and we think this will be a useful deterrent to prevent these kinds of illegal sales in the future. What the Ohio History Connection can best bring to the table is that our State Historic Preservation Office has the ability to record objects such as the cannons and artillery described in this legislation in our historic/archaeological inventories. From the definition in the legislation it appears that most of these relics will be located in outdoor settings. This might take some time to initially set up, but we're equipped to handle this and carry

out the intent of the legislation with the cooperation of the organizations across Ohio that maintain the cannons/artillery on their property.
