Chairman Hillyer, Vice Chair Grendell, Ranking Member Galonski, thank you for the opportunity to testify on this emergency legislation. As my colleague said, HB 32 will only halt debt collection and accrual of interest to entities that the legislature has authority over which are any state operated hospitals or institutions of higher education. Representative Ingram and I are not seeking to halt debt collection for any reason other than medical or student debt. As we all know, the accrual of fees and interest on this debt negatively impact students and working families in normal circumstances. However, the constantly increasing size of debt during an unprecedented pandemic and economic crisis may make the prospect of future financial stability impossible.
