I strongly appose HB22. This bill is too ambiguous. By having no set standard for 'distraction' this bill leaves a very slippery slope for what one person might think vs. what another might think.

There are laws on the books now that cover these items that are in HB22, all we need to do is enforce them. We do not need to add more. I would think that everyone above the age of 9-10 would know that you must follow the lawful order of a P.O. I think the operative word here is lawful. What would stop any Officer from saying to leave an area, just because they do not want anyone watching what they are doing? Another slippery slope. As far as taunting, striking, or throwing an object, these are all covered in laws that we already have on the books.

Our 1<sup>st</sup> amendment gives us the right to free speech, I want to continue to have my freedom of speech. Look back to the History of our great nation, and the History of our Civil Rights.
