Criminal Justice Committee Opposition Testimony to HB 99 Submitted By Lorrie Levengood 11/1/2021

Chair LaRe, Vice Chair Swearingen, Ranking Member Leland, and members of the committee, thank you for allowing me to present this testimony.

I am writing in regards to HB 99. My name is Lorrie Levengood. I have taught in Ohio schools for 34 years as an intervention specialist. I am deeply distressed by the possibility that the Ohio Legislature might drastically reduce safety training requirements for teachers and other civilians who carry loaded handguns inside elementary, middle and high schools.

I believe that allowing teachers or others to carry guns in schools is not a sound security practice and would likely further endanger our students and staff. Introducing more guns in schools increases the risk of gun violence. Guns in the hands of untrained individuals heightens the possibility of accidents, guns falling into the hands of students, and more gun incidents in our schools.

Law enforcement officers receive an average of 730 hours of basic training, including 168 hours of training on weapons, self-defense, and the use of force. Twenty-eight hours of training (only a few of which seem to involve live firing) is hardly enough to qualify these individuals to carry loaded, concealed weapons around children and teachers. Even some of the most highly trained law enforcement in the country see their ability to shoot accurately decrease significantly when engaged in gunfights with perpetrators. I cannot imagine the damage that teachers and others with only a few hours training will do in the middle of a gunfight.

Please stop this bill from going any further to protect our students and staff.
