*Joint-Sponsor Testimony, House Bill 511*

*May 25<sup>th</sup>, 2022*

**Rep. Stewart:** Good afternoon Chairman LaRe, Vice-Chair White, Ranking Member Leland, and all of the other members on the Criminal Justice Committee. Thank you for giving me the opportunity to provide sponsor testimony in favor of House Bill 511, which will require the electronic recordings of parole board hearings and make recording requestable.

Currently, Ohio parole board is not required in any capacity to record parole hearings. As of 2019, of which is the most current data, 21,832 Ohioans were under parole, and 222,292 under probation<sup>1</sup>. With so many parolees, it puzzling how eight people on the parole board can hold hearings without a recording of it anywhere. H.B. 511 would fix this and allow any party, person, or entity including the inmate who is the subject of said hearing to request the Department of Rehabilitation and Correction to provide an electronic recording. Additionally, if the party, person, or entity wishes to have a recording transcribed, can do so at their own expense<sup>2</sup>.

It is also important to mention that the electronic recordings of parole hearings will not include the name, date of birth, home or work address, social security
