My name is James Bridgens. I live in Ohio and am a resident of Madison, in Lake county. I am 65 years of age. I served my country as an Electrician's Mate on a submarine. Currently I am an engineer in the power industry. I am an officer in my local American Legion post. This is a personal testimony as a proponent of House Bill 248, The Vaccine Choice and Anti-Discrimination Act, and not for any individual, organization or business.

My rights come from God, not from a political body. The foundation of our republic, The Declaration of Independence clearly states this.
