Chairman Lipps, Vice Chair Holmes, Ranking Member Russo, and Members of the House Health Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide proponent testimony on House Bill 248.

My name is Patricia Nespor Platt. I am medical researcher and writer. As such, and as a mother of a child who has sustained vaccine damage, I support House Bill 248 for a number of reasons. First, the government should **not** be able to force citizens to have their bodies penetrated and injected--particularly with experimental substances--against their will, as such coercion would violate the Nuremberg Code as well as numerous freedoms, including religious freedoms. Second, the evidence of the benefits of vaccines is by no means consistent, and the anti-covid injections have already caused a large burden of injury and death. Third, I am living with an autoimmune condition, and the experimental injections have been shown to be particularly injurious and even more deadly to people with autoimmunity. Fourth, the injections cause the body to make spike proteins which, among other deleterious effects, can lead to infertility in women. Fifth, given the propaganda surrounding the experimental injections being promoted, I fear that those opting not to be jabbed may be persecuted unless they are given legal protection. Finally, forced vaccination crumbles under the simplest of logical tests, for, if vaccines work as they are said to, those who are unvaccinated are not putting anyone who is vaccinated at risk, and if vaccines do not work as they are said to, then why should anyone be forced to get one? For all of the above reason, I strongly support House Bill 248, the Vaccine Choice and Anti-Discrimination Act. I urge you to do the same.
