Chairman Lipps, Vice Chair Holmes, Ranking Member Russo, and Members of the House Health Committee, thank you for the opportunity to provide proponent testimony on House Bill 248.

My name is Brooke Hutchins. I am a 1st grade teacher in my community and coach volleyball for a local high school. I 100% support HB 248 for many reasons. First, this bill does not mean those who want to get the vaccine cannot get it. It simply means we all get a choice when it comes to this very important issue. If someone would like to get a vaccine, they should be allowed to do so. For those, like me, who wish to wait for more data to be compiled, we should be allowed the freedom to choose. This was the foundation of our great country that is very quickly eroding and fading into a totalitarian government.

I have read where many opponents mentioned if this bill passes it would cause economic damage. I strongly disagree. In fact, if HB 248 doesn't pass, the economy will suffer far greater due to employees being terminated for not taking an experimental drug that has not made it through all its required clinical trials. Businesses will be forced to close; residents will relocate to other states that give their residents a right to choose what they put into their bodies, homes will go into foreclosure, etc. To think our rights and freedoms are being stripped over a virus that has a 99% survival rate is unthinkable.
