Opponent Testimony on HB 322 Ohio House State and Local Government Committee Sept. 21, 2021

Chair Wiggam, Vice Chair John, Ranking Member Kelly, and members of the committee, thank you for allowing me to testify today. My name is Bear F. Braumoeller. I am a faculty member at Ohio State University, though I rarely teach or research anything that would be touched on by the content of this bill. I write to you as an Ohio voter whose family's affiliation with the Republican Party stretches back across generations, and I address myself particularly to the Republican members of the Committee.

I strongly oppose House Bill 322.

At a superficial level, the bill's provisions are mostly unobjectionable. I agree wholeheartedly, for example, that no race or sex is inherently superior to another race or sex. Far more objectionable, however, is the idea that the state should regulate speech, especially in higher education. Ideas cannot be defeated if they cannot be confronted. Republicans have long championed the free exchange of ideas in education and derided liberal "snowflakes" who seek content regulation in the form of safe spaces and trigger warnings. Conservatives have often repeated a quote attributed to Voltaire: "I disapprove of what you say, but I will defend to the death your right to say it." The Republican Party of 2021 is, of course, in flux, but that makes it even more important to stand on the firm ground of principle. This bill flies in the face of many decades of Republican principle.

It also rests on an inaccurate picture of the children and grandchildren of the state of Ohio. As someone who engages with them often in the classroom, I can tell you firsthand that they're terrific. They are smart, they are passionate, they are engaged citizens, they are fully capable of debating big issues, and they are not afraid of ideas that challenge their beliefs. I realize that, to many of you, today's students were in diapers not long ago. But you've done well. You've raised young people who have earned my respect. I would urge you to extend to them that same respect by not regulating the questions and ideas that they are allowed to debate in the classroom.
