To Rep. Wiggam, Chair; Rep. John, Vice Chair; Rep. Kelly, Ranking Member; and Members of the State and Local Government Committee:

I respectfully write this letter asking you to oppose **H.J.R. 1**, Ohio's current resolution (application) asking Congress to call a "Convention of the States".

I am the Chair of **No Convention of States North Carolina (NoCOS-NC)**, a non-partisan grassroots network of North Carolina citizens who are opposed to the convening of a Convention of the States (SEE FULL DESCRIPTION BELOW MY SIGNATURE.) On October 19, 2021, I wrote to the **Ohio Senate Government Oversight and Reform Committee in opposition to H.J.R. 1**. I care enough about this critical issue to write to you again. It is not my usual practice to contact Members of other State Legislatures. In this case, I persistently do so because the possibility of convening a federal convention under Article V of the U.S. Constitution is a very serious and risky matter that affects ALL AMERICANS. And the proposal to call a "Convention **of the States**" - a convention that is based on a manufactured process <u>not</u> authorized in Article V - is even more egregious. I am grateful that over time as state legislators have looked more deeply into the subject, many of them are wisely rejecting the *Convention of States Project*'s "solution" to the problem of reining in the federal government.

I urge you to **VOTE NO on H.J.R. 1** because:

- There is no such thing as a Convention of States (COS) under Article V. It is an invented process with an invented history. Newly named and devised in 2010, the inventors compare an Article V convention to ordinary multi-state meetings that took place at certain points in our nation's history. This type of meeting was sometimes referred to as a "convention of the states." The inventors of today propose a very different convention method than the Founders established in Article V. The Convention of States supporters' proposed method is for the state legislatures to control the convention process by sending state legislators as delegates to the convention.
- The only thing the States can do is apply for (request, ask) Congress to call an Article V convention. Their authority stops there. Congress has indicated that it has the authority to make details for the convention, but even this has not been decided. (As Congressional Research Service Reports for 2014, 2016 and the recent update in 2017 confirm.)
- The convention has sovereign authority. The delegates to the convention represent the sovereign people, not state legislatures and not Congress. Once the Convention convenes, paragraph 2 of the Declaration of Independence, gives delegates the authority as government-makers to throw out proposed rules by any outside entity, make their own rules and potentially make a new government. This includes what entities would ratify the amendments that the Convention has proposed. The Convention could change the rules from the current 38 States necessary to ratify an amendment and turn the ratification process over to the President, a popular referendum, or some other entity.
- The Legislatures can make laws for their State, but <u>have no authority</u> over the convention. State Legislatures <u>do not have the legal authority to fine, jail or penalize</u> <u>the delegates they send to the convention.</u> Once at the convention, the delegates represent the People, not the Legislatures.

- The recent revival of an outcry for an Article V convention is not genuinely from "We the People." It is fueled by out-of-state special interest organizations that show up just about every twenty years with a new ploy to convene a very risky convention then they pass it off as a grassroots movement. The movement is driven in the background by powerful wealthy individuals and organizations (from the Right and the Left) who want to change the Constitution beyond recognition to suit their purposes. This is nothing new. It has been going on for many decades on and on and on!
- The potential for unintended consequences abound. Although, the stated goal of the
 Convention of States supporters is to "rein in" or "restrain" the federal government, many
 of the amendments proposed by "conservative" COS supporters do not reduce or even
 limit the power of the federal government, they EXPAND it and weaken the Constitution
 and weaken the power of the states in the process. (Specific examples are available
 upon request.) And many Democratic Legislators have said that they do not want to risk
 losing the rights they have fought so hard to attain.

In 1991, when a similar attempt to convene a convention was in play, respected law Professor Christopher Brown (Univ. of Maryland) stated: "[A convention] would create a major distraction to ordinary concerns, imposing a disabling effect on this country's domestic and foreign policies." In 2022, tensions are high in this nation. Our nation is as polarized and volatile as it has ever been. It is difficult to tell what reports in the Media are accurate. And now, Big Tech censorship is in question. The last thing we need is the "major distraction" and the "disabling effect" of a constitutional convention — or of an Article V convention that goes by any other name. There will be unintended consequences for sure — and some intended consequences are probable as well.

<u>The only solution</u> is for the People and their elected officials to know, understand and obey the Constitution that we have now - and to use it more effectively.

I urge you to **VOTE NO on H.J.R. 1** and any other application asking Congress to call an Article V convention.
