## r.e.: HB6 Bailout of the OVEC Coal Plants

My name is Dennis Meyers, a lifelong citizen of the state and a lifelong customer of Ohio Edison/First Energy. I currently live in Amherst Ohio.

Now 68 years of age, I've been witness to the endless bailouts and giveaways to the states electric utility companys over the course of these many years. I have been the owner of an all-electric home for the past 26 years and have seen the cost of electricity go up and up unchecked. The ability to choose an electricity generator-provider does little to ameliorate the overall cost when the charge for delivery is more than that for the electricity itself, due to all of the "riders" and attachments to the rate.

The PUCO and the republican dominated state government have always been unapologetic shills for First Energy, granting them whatever outrageous handout they demanded. Even after the recent \$60 million HB6 bribery conspiracy—scandal between state government and First Energy, state representatives were reluctant to repeal any part of the bill, hoping that the public uproar would eventually subside.
