Sponsor Testimony

Senate Bill 346
Ohio Senate Government Oversight and Reform Committee
November 15, 2022

Chair Roegner, Vice Chair McColley, Ranking Member Craig, and members of the Senate Government Oversight and Reform Committee: Thank you for the opportunity to provide sponsor testimony on Senate Bill 346.

This legislation would designate April 27th as Ulysses S. Grant Day here in Ohio. Ulysses S. Grant was a General of the United States Army and the 18th President of the United States. A true native of Ohio, Grant was born on April 27, 1822 in Point Pleasant of Clermont County, and spent most of his early life in Georgetown of Brown County.

Grant played an instrumental role in the American Civil War under President Abraham Lincoln. Notably, his leadership earned the Union victory at some of the most significant battles of the Civil War, including the Battle of Vicksburg through the Appomattox Campaign and eventually the surrender of the Confederacy.

Remaining steadfast, he refused to accept any "terms except unconditional and immediate surrender." This philosophy quickly gave him the title "Unconditional Surrender Grant." He was wholeheartedly dedicated to the men who fought alongside him, using caution and carefully calculated strategy to defeat the Confederacy battle after battle until the end of the Civil War. Grant was a true American patriot and hero.
