Senate Bill 336

Sponsor Testimony Ohio Senate Health Committee June 1, 2022

Chairman Huffman, Vice Chair Antani, Ranking Member Antonio, and members of the Health Committee: Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to provide sponsor testimony on Senate Bill 336.

Simply put, Senate Bill 336 seeks to protect our children from the harmful effects of tanning beds by prohibiting minors under the age of 18 from using indoor tanning beds. According to the American Academy of Dermatology Association, almost 33% of those who use tanning beds first began their use before the age of 18.¹ The ultraviolet light from tanning beds is a known carcinogen. Exposure to this harmful UV light at a young age can increase the risk of developing many types of skin cancer, including melanoma. It has been reported that tanning bed use prior to the age of 35 can increase the probability of developing melanoma by a startling 59%, and the likelihood of developing melanoma increases with each use.²

Current law in our state only allows a minor under the age of 18 to use indoor tanning beds with parental consent, but this bill will help protect even more children from the detrimental effects of indoor tanning beds. Twenty-two other states and Washington, D.C. also have laws prohibiting children under the age of 18 from indoor tanning.

Additionally, I would like to note that Senate Bill 336 is a companion bill to House Bill 159, sponsored by Representatives Hillyer and Lightbody. At this point, the two bills are identical to one another.
