

#### Summary of PRE4CLE

- Initiative to expand access to highquality preschool to all 3- and 4-yearolds in Cleveland
- Launched in 2014
- Led by city, county, school district, early learning, and community partners
- Approximately \$25 million/year in local funding toward preschool in Cleveland





#### Urgent Challenges in Ohio's Child Care System

- Staffing shortages are severely reducing child care availability for working families.
- Ohio's low child care eligibility leaves many families without options.
- Ohio's underfunded childcare system is driving low wages and system instability.

#### Ohio's Child Care Workforce



- Overall, in Ohio, 62% of child care programs are reporting a staffing shortage (NAEYC, 2022)
- Shortages are a result of low wages and a lack of qualified applicants.

#### **Examples from regional surveys:**

- 2,500 vacant child care positions in Northeast Ohio (December 2022, Starting Point)
- 1,985 vacant child care positions in Central Ohio (November 2022, Action for Children)

#### Child Care Wages in Ohio: Actual Wages in March 2022

Average Ohio Child Care Teacher: \$11-\$13/Hour, few or no benefits

Amazon starting wage: \$16-18/hour, full benefits

Target starting wage: \$15/hour, health care, PTO, tuition

reimbursement

Car Wash Assistant: \$15/hour, some benefits



## Budget Request: \$100 million to Support Ohio's Child Care Workforce

- \$75 million- continue child care stabilization grants to attract and retain teachers and staff
- \$25 million- funding for community colleges and child care resource and referral organizations to rapidly rebuild Ohio's child care workforce






#### Raising Ohio's Child Care Eligibility

- Ohio's low child care eligibility level leaves tens of thousands of families under 200% of the federal poverty level without affordable child care options
- Average cost of child care in Ohio is \$9,700 for infants and \$7,900 for preschoolers
- A family of four at 200% of poverty PREMakes \$55,000/year

Many Ohio children from families with low incomes did not have access to early learning opportunities in 2020-2022.

 Invest \$75 million to raise Ohio's child care eligibility level from proposed 160% to 200% of the federal poverty level


Continue to support lower co-payments for working

families






#### Building the Workforce of Tomorrow: Kindergarten Readiness






# Percent of Kindergarteners in Approaching & Demonstrating Bands of KRA in Cleveland
