Hello. My name is Grace Shults, I am about to enter my fifth year at Ohio State as a Psychology Major. I wanted to testify that I am strongly opposed to HB 151.

The proposed changes to Higher Education that are in this bill are harmful to students, faculty, and the learning process in higher education overall. Making education more equitable for everyone is not a bad thing, and should not be treated as so. This bill proposes to censor students and faculty through banning DEI trainings, making syllabi public, and creating new mandates in the classroom as a "protection of intellectual diversity rights."

There is a fact that this proposed legislation ignores: while college students are young, we are still adults. We have the capacity to make up our own minds, and shape our own world views as we see fit. Our lawmakers do not need to be involved in telling us how to learn in an environment that we pay money to attend.

It is ironic as it has been proposed in the name of "protecting academic freedom."
