[Columbus, OH, 5/17/23] — Dear Chair Young, Vice Chair Miller, and members of the House Higher Education Committee committee members. My name is Khalid Dada, and I am here today to express my opposition to House Bill 151. As a recent graduate of the Ohio State University and former President of the Muslim Students Association (MSA), I have seen firsthand the importance of student organizations like the MSA in creating a sense of community and support for minority and underrepresented students.

House Bill 151 proposes to require that all student organizations receive approval from the university's Board of Trustees before being recognized as official organizations. The MSA is one of Ohio State's largest and most active student organizations. It provides a safe space for Muslim students to connect, engage in community service and activism, and to celebrate their faith and cultural traditions. Without the MSA, I would not have been able to serve as a leader and make positive strides for the future of Muslim students at Ohio State and around the nation. The MSA serves as a platform for Muslim students to exercise their rights to freedom of association, speech, and religion, which are fundamental rights guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution.

Furthermore, this bill can potentially impact all student organizations, including those representing other religious or cultural groups. By adding layers of bureaucracy and restrictions, this bill would make it harder for students to create and sustain organizations that serve their interests and needs.

These organizations provide opportunities for students to engage in meaningful activities outside of the classroom, develop leadership skills, and connect with like-minded peers. House Bill 151 threatens to undermine that vital work by making it harder for student organizations to operate and potentially censoring their activities. It would also have a chilling effect on free speech and association—vital components of a thriving and diverse college campus.

To conclude, I urge you to reject House Bill 151. It is a threat to the fundamental rights of students and the vibrant campus culture that makes Ohio State and other academic institutions in Ohio so unique. As a young leader, I speak from experience since I have made it my responsibility to ensure every student is heard and their rights are upheld.
