Policies like HB 183 will only exacerbate these problems, pushing transgender students further to the margins of society. The impact on their mental health and general well-being cannot be overstated.

Additionally, this bill presents insurmountable and, frankly, inappropriate challenges in its enforcement. Individuals can legally change the gender markers on their birth certificates, rendering them ineffective as a means of enforcing this bill. And of course, the very notion of visually inspecting children to determine their "biological sex" is not only a gross invasion of privacy but also completely unacceptable on ethical grounds.

It is crucial to consider the real-world implications of this bill. When laws marginalize an already vulnerable population, we are failing in our responsibility to ensure the safety and welfare of all Ohioans. House Bill 183 is not just a policy proposal; it is a direct threat to the health and well-being of transgender youth like my child.

I urge you to stand up for the dignity, health, and safety of all Ohio's students by opposing House Bill 183.
