Testimony: Opposition for House Bill 183

Chair Young, Vice Chair Manning, Ranking Member Miller, and Members of the Higher Education Committee, thank you for accepting my written testimony. My name is Laurel Soren, I'm a constituent of House District 15, and I use they/them pronouns.

I was born, raised, and currently reside in the Greater Cleveland area. I have a successful career at a Fortune 500 company where I am supported as a member of the LGBTQ+ community. The support of colleagues and management has been instrumental in my journey to live as my authentic self. I was assigned female at birth, and part of my journey included coming out as non-binary trans. While that transition was and continues to be welcomed at work, I do not always feel welcomed in my home state of Ohio. Each piece of anti-LGBTQ+ legislation is mentally and emotionally taxing.

Public bathrooms are a topic of stress for many folks in the community and they have come with increased stress for me as I started presenting less and less femme. I get the occasional second look, especially when I am dressed business professional. I attended college while working full time and while I am no longer a student, I can think of many reasons to be on campus to this day – sporting events, theatre, graduation, and recruiting just to name a few. If I get second looks in everyday life using the bathroom that this bill states I need to, what will happen to me at a university if this bill passes? I don't know. And I am afraid to find out.

After earning my MS in Chemistry from Cleveland State University, before accepting my authentic self, I chose to stay in the Cleveland area. Ohio has always been home for me, and I couldn't imagine another place to settle my roots. However, as more and more anti LGBTQ+ legislation is brought forward in the state of Ohio, I have had to question at what point is it no longer safe for me to remain an Ohioan. I have personally heard the same sentiment echoed from other gender diverse folks. If I, a person with an established career, have this thought, what about folks who are in college with a sea of opportunity ahead of them? We already struggle with brain drain, and this would be one more contributing factor to the weakening of our great state.

I ask you to protect the rights of your constituents and give the future of our state a chance. I ask you to vote NO on HB 183.
