Chair Dolan, Vice Chair Cirino, Ranking Member Sykes, Senator Brenner, and other distinguished members of the Senate:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide written testimony on House Bill 33 requesting the Senate Finance Committee support \$3 million in funding in the FY 24 -25 Ohio operating budget to expand workforce development, financial literacy, and entrepreneurship programming to Ohio students.

Twenty-one years ago, I was an 18-year-old senior just weeks away from high school graduation. Many would agree that this is one of the most exciting times in a young person's life. For me, it was one of the scariest. As I sit back and think about my career journey post-high school, I can't help to think how differently my chosen path would have been, had I been given the opportunity to explore career pathways and financial literacy education through Junior Achievement programs. It's evident to me that I wouldn't have changed my major four times, and I certainly wouldn't have spent so much time and money trying to figure out what the future could offer me. As I mentor students today through my employment at Junior Achievement, I emphasize my story in hopes that they will begin to find their passion through career exploration programs at a much earlier age.
