Dana Miller: Position Against Ohio SB83

Chairman Cirino, Vice Chair Rulli, Ranking Member Ingram, and Members of the Senate Workforce and Higher Education Committee:

Thank you for allowing me to submit my testimony. My name is Dana Miller. I do not represent any institution but rather am submitting testimony as a private citizen in opposition to Senate Bill 83.

I was born when The Voting Rights Act of 1965 was signed into law and since then the U.S. has attempted to develop a multi-racial democracy which is an idea, I believe, that SB83 would view as controversial.

Those that are afraid...and they got really afraid in the summer of 2020...have created bills like SB83 which are nothing more than an inky black smokescreen squirted by a scared squid to create confusion, division, and administrative bloat.
