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**A BILL**

To amend sections 3310.03, 3310.032, 3333.16, and 1  
3345.81 and to enact sections 3302.103, 2  
3310.033, 3345.351, and 3345.481 of the Revised 3  
Code and to amend Sections 265.10 and 265.210 of 4  
H.B. 166 of the 133rd General Assembly with 5  
regard to student degree completion at state 6  
institutions of higher education, to modify 7  
eligibility criteria for the Educational Choice 8  
Scholarship program, to dissolve certain 9  
academic distress commissions, to make an 10  
appropriation, and to declare an emergency. 11

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:**

**Section 1.** That sections 3310.03, 3310.032, 3333.16, and 12  
3345.81 be amended and sections 3302.103, 3310.033, 3345.351, 13  
and 3345.481 of the Revised Code be enacted to read as follows: 14

Sec. 3302.103. (A) Beginning on the effective date of this 15  
section, an academic distress commission established under 16  
section 3302.10 of the Revised Code on or before the effective 17  
date of this section shall begin to transition operational, 18  
managerial, and instructional control from the academic distress 19  
commission and the chief executive officer appointed by the 20  
commission back to the district board of education if the 21  
district for which the commission was established received an 22  
overall grade of "D" or higher under division (C) (3) of section 23  
3302.03 of the Revised Code on the state report card for the 24  
2018-2019 school year. During the transition period, the chief 25  
executive officer shall work closely with the district board and 26  
the district superintendent to increase their ability to resume 27  
control of the district and sustain the district's academic 28  
improvement over time. 29

(B) During the transition period, the district shall 30  
continue to operate under the academic distress commission as 31  
prescribed in section 3302.10 of the Revised Code until June 30, 32  
2020. On that date, the chief executive officer shall relinquish 33  
all operational, managerial, and instructional control of the 34  
district to the district board and district superintendent, and 35  
the academic distress commission shall cease to exist. 36

(C) The department of education shall pay the remainder of 37  
each chief executive officer's contract upon dissolution of the 38  
academic distress commission as specified in division (A) of 39  
this section. 40

**Sec. 3310.03.** A student is an "eligible student" for 41  
purposes of the educational choice scholarship pilot program if 42  
the student's resident district is not a school district in 43  
which the pilot project scholarship program is operating under 44

sections 3313.974 to 3313.979 of the Revised Code and the 45  
student satisfies one of the conditions in division (A), (B), 46  
(C), (D), or (E) of this section: 47

(A) (1) The student is enrolled in a school building 48  
operated by the student's resident district that, on the report 49  
card issued under section 3302.03 of the Revised Code published 50  
prior to the first day of July of the school year for which a 51  
scholarship is sought, did not receive a rating as described in 52  
division (I) of this section, and to which any or a combination 53  
of any of the following apply for two of the three most recent 54  
report cards published prior to the first day of July of the 55  
school year for which a scholarship is sought: 56

(a) The building was declared to be in a state of academic 57  
emergency or academic watch under section 3302.03 of the Revised 58  
Code as that section existed prior to March 22, 2013. 59

(b) The building received a grade of "D" or "F" for the 60  
performance index score under division (A) (1) (b) or (B) (1) (b) of 61  
section 3302.03 of the Revised Code and for the value-added 62  
progress dimension under division (A) (1) (e) or (B) (1) (e) of 63  
section 3302.03 of the Revised Code for the 2012-2013, 2013- 64  
2014, 2014-2015, or 2015-2016 school year; or if the building 65  
serves only grades ten through twelve, the building received a 66  
grade of "D" or "F" for the performance index score under 67  
division (A) (1) (b) or (B) (1) (b) of section 3302.03 of the 68  
Revised Code and had a four-year adjusted cohort graduation rate 69  
of less than seventy-five per cent. 70

(c) The building received an overall grade of "D" or "F" 71  
under division (C) (3) of section 3302.03 of the Revised Code or 72  
a grade of "F" for the value-added progress dimension under 73  
division (C) (1) (e) of section 3302.03 of the Revised Code for 74

the 2016-2017 school year or any school year thereafter. 75

(2) The student will be enrolling in any of grades 76  
kindergarten through twelve in this state for the first time in 77  
the school year for which a scholarship is sought, will be at 78  
least five years of age by the first day of January of the 79  
school year for which a scholarship is sought, and otherwise 80  
would be assigned under section 3319.01 of the Revised Code in 81  
the school year for which a scholarship is sought, to a school 82  
building described in division (A) (1) of this section. 83

(3) The student is enrolled in a community school 84  
established under Chapter 3314. of the Revised Code but 85  
otherwise would be assigned under section 3319.01 of the Revised 86  
Code to a building described in division (A) (1) of this section. 87

(4) The student is enrolled in a school building operated 88  
by the student's resident district or in a community school 89  
established under Chapter 3314. of the Revised Code and 90  
otherwise would be assigned under section 3319.01 of the Revised 91  
Code to a school building described in division (A) (1) of this 92  
section in the school year for which the scholarship is sought. 93

(5) The student will be both enrolling in any of grades 94  
kindergarten through twelve in this state for the first time and 95  
at least five years of age by the first day of January of the 96  
school year for which a scholarship is sought, or is enrolled in 97  
a community school established under Chapter 3314. of the 98  
Revised Code, and all of the following apply to the student's 99  
resident district: 100

(a) The district has in force an intradistrict open 101  
enrollment policy under which no student in the student's grade 102  
level is automatically assigned to a particular school building; 103

(b) In the most recent rating published prior to the first day of July of the school year for which scholarship is sought, the district did not receive a rating described in division (I) of this section, and in at least two of the three most recent report cards published prior to the first day of July of that school year, any or a combination of the following apply to the district:

(i) The district was declared to be in a state of academic emergency under section 3302.03 of the Revised Code as it existed prior to March 22, 2013.

(ii) The district received a grade of "D" or "F" for the performance index score under division (A) (1) (b) or (B) (1) (b) of section 3302.03 of the Revised Code and for the value-added progress dimension under division (A) (1) (e) or (B) (1) (e) of section 3302.03 of the Revised Code for the 2012-2013, 2013-2014, 2014-2015, or 2015-2016 school year.

~~(e)-(iii)~~ The district received an overall grade of "D" or "F" under division (C) (3) of section 3302.03 of the Revised Code or a grade of "F" for the value-added progress dimension under division (C) (1) (e) of section 3302.03 of the Revised Code for the 2016-2017 school year or any school year thereafter.

(6) ~~Beginning in the 2019-2020 school year~~On or after the effective date of this amendment, the student meets both of the following conditions:

(a) The student was enrolled in a public or nonpublic school or was homeschooled in the prior school year and completed ~~any of grades~~ grade eight through eleven in that school year.

(b) The student would be assigned to a building in the

(B) (1) The student is enrolled in a school building	149
operated by the student's resident district and to which both of	150
the following apply:	151
(a) The building was ranked, for at least two of the three	152
most recent rankings prior to the first day of July of the	153
school year for which a scholarship is sought, in the lowest ten	154
per cent of all buildings operated by city, local, and exempted	155
village school districts according to performance index score as	156
determined by the department of education.	157
(b) The building was not declared to be excellent or	158
effective, or the equivalent of such ratings as determined by	159
the department, under section 3302.03 of the Revised Code in the	160
most recent rating published prior to the first day of July of	161

the school year for which a scholarship is sought.	162
(2) The student will be enrolling in any of grades	163
kindergarten through twelve in this state for the first time in	164
the school year for which a scholarship is sought, will be at	165

Revised Code, by the first day of January of the school year for	167
which a scholarship is sought, and otherwise would be assigned	168
under section 3319.01 of the Revised Code in the school year for	169

(3) The student is enrolled in a community school	172
established under Chapter 3314. of the Revised Code but	173
otherwise would be assigned under section 3319.01 of the Revised	174

(D) For the 2016-2017 school year and each school year	187
thereafter, the student is in any of grades kindergarten through	188
three, is enrolled in a school building that is operated by the	189
student's resident district or will be enrolling in any of	190

grades kindergarten through twelve in this state for the first 191  
time in the school year for which a scholarship is sought, and 192  
to which both of the following apply: 193

(1) The building, in at least two of the three most recent 194  
ratings of school buildings published prior to the first day of 195  
July of the school year for which a scholarship is sought, 196  
received a grade of "D" or "F" for making progress in improving 197  
literacy in grades kindergarten through three under division (B) 198  
(1) (g) or (C) (1) (g) of section 3302.03 of the Revised Code; 199

(2) The building did not receive a grade of "A" for making 200  
progress in improving literacy in grades kindergarten through 201  
three under division (B) (1) (g) or (C) (1) (g) of section 3302.03 202  
of the Revised Code in the most recent rating published prior to 203  
the first day of July of the school year for which a scholarship 204  
is sought. 205

(E) The student's resident district is subject to section 206  
3302.10 of the Revised Code and the student either: 207

(1) Is enrolled in a school building operated by the 208  
resident district or in a community school established under 209  
Chapter 3314. of the Revised Code; 210

(2) Will be both enrolling in any of grades kindergarten 211  
through twelve in this state for the first time and at least 212  
five years of age by the first day of January of the school year 213  
for which a scholarship is sought. 214

(F) A student who receives a scholarship under the 215  
educational choice scholarship pilot program remains an eligible 216  
student and may continue to receive scholarships in subsequent 217  
school years until the student completes grade twelve, so long 218  
as all of the following apply: 219



(1) The student's resident district remains the same, or 220  
the student transfers to a new resident district and otherwise 221  
would be assigned in the new resident district to a school 222  
building described in division (A) (1), (B) (1), (D), or (E) of 223  
this section. 224

(2) Except as provided in divisions (K) (1) and (L) of 225  
section 3301.0711 of the Revised Code, the student takes each 226  
assessment prescribed for the student's grade level under 227  
section 3301.0710 or 3301.0712 of the Revised Code while 228  
enrolled in a chartered nonpublic school. 229

(3) In each school year that the student is enrolled in a 230  
chartered nonpublic school, the student is absent from school 231  
for not more than twenty days that the school is open for 232  
instruction, not including excused absences. 233

(G) (1) The department shall cease awarding first-time 234  
scholarships pursuant to divisions (A) (1) to (4) of this section 235  
with respect to a school building that, in the most recent 236  
ratings of school buildings published under section 3302.03 of 237  
the Revised Code prior to the first day of July of the school 238  
year, ceases to meet the criteria in division (A) (1) of this 239  
section. The department shall cease awarding first-time 240  
scholarships pursuant to division (A) (5) of this section with 241  
respect to a school district that, in the most recent ratings of 242  
school districts published under section 3302.03 of the Revised 243  
Code prior to the first day of July of the school year, ceases 244  
to meet the criteria in division (A) (5) of this section. 245

(2) The department shall cease awarding first-time 246  
scholarships pursuant to divisions (B) (1) to (4) of this section 247  
with respect to a school building that, in the most recent 248  
ratings of school buildings under section 3302.03 of the Revised 249

Code prior to the first day of July of the school year, ceases	250
to meet the criteria in division (B)(1) of this section.	251
(3) The department shall cease awarding first-time	252
scholarships pursuant to division (D) of this section with	253
respect to a school building that, in the most recent ratings of	254
school buildings under section 3302.03 of the Revised Code prior	255
to the first day of July of the school year, ceases to meet the	256
criteria in division (D) of this section.	257
(4) The department shall cease awarding first-time	258
scholarships pursuant to division (E) of this section with	259
respect to a school district subject to section 3302.10 of the	260
Revised Code when the academic distress commission established	261
for the district ceases to exist.	262
(5) However, students who have received scholarships in	263
the prior school year remain eligible students pursuant to	264
division (F) of this section.	265
(H) The state board of education shall adopt rules	266
defining excused absences for purposes of division (F)(3) of	267
this section.	268
(I)(1) A student who satisfies only the conditions	269
prescribed in divisions (A)(1) to (4) of this section shall not	270
be eligible for a scholarship if the student's resident building	271
meets any of the following in the most recent rating under	272
section 3302.03 of the Revised Code published prior to the first	273
day of July of the school year for which a scholarship is	274
sought:	275
(a) The building has an overall designation of excellent	276
or effective under section 3302.03 of the Revised Code as it	277
existed prior to March 22, 2013.	278

(b) For the 2012-2013, 2013-2014, 2014-2015, or 2015-2016 279  
school year, the building has a grade of "A" or "B" for the 280  
performance index score under division (A) (1) (b) or (B) (1) (b) of 281  
section 3302.03 of the Revised Code and for the value-added 282  
progress dimension under division (A) (1) (e) or (B) (1) (e) of 283  
section 3302.03 of the Revised Code; or if the building serves 284  
only grades ten through twelve, the building received a grade of 285  
"A" or "B" for the performance index score under division (A) (1) 286  
(b) or (B) (1) (b) of section 3302.03 of the Revised Code and had 287  
a four-year adjusted cohort graduation rate of greater than or 288  
equal to seventy-five per cent. 289

(c) For the 2016-2017 school year or any school year 290  
thereafter, the building has a grade of "A" or "B" under 291  
division (C) (3) of section 3302.03 of the Revised Code and a 292  
grade of "A" for the value-added progress dimension under 293  
division (C) (1) (e) of section 3302.03 of the Revised Code; or if 294  
the building serves only grades ten through twelve, the building 295  
received a grade of "A" or "B" for the performance index score 296  
under division (C) (1) (b) of section 3302.03 of the Revised Code 297  
and had a four-year adjusted cohort graduation rate of greater 298  
than or equal to seventy-five per cent. 299

(2) A student who satisfies only the conditions prescribed 300  
in division (A) (5) of this section shall not be eligible for a 301  
scholarship if the student's resident district meets any of the 302  
following in the most recent rating under section 3302.03 of the 303  
Revised Code published prior to the first day of July of the 304  
school year for which a scholarship is sought: 305

(a) The district has an overall designation of excellent 306  
or effective under section 3302.03 of the Revised Code as it 307  
existed prior to March 22, 2013. 308

(b) The district has a grade of "A" or "B" for the 309  
performance index score under division (A) (1) (b) or (B) (1) (b) of 310  
section 3302.03 of the Revised Code and for the value-added 311  
progress dimension under division (A) (1) (e) or (B) (1) (e) of 312  
section 3302.03 of the Revised Code for the 2012-2013, 2013- 313  
2014, 2014-2015, and 2015-2016 school years. 314

(c) The district has an overall grade of "A" or "B" under 315  
division (C) (3) of section 3302.03 of the Revised Code and a 316  
grade of "A" for the value-added progress dimension under 317  
division (C) (1) (e) of section 3302.03 of the Revised Code for 318  
the 2016-2017 school year or any school year thereafter. 319

**Sec. 3310.032.** (A) A student is an "eligible student" for 320  
purposes of the expansion of the educational choice scholarship 321  
pilot program under this section if the student's resident 322  
district is not a school district in which the pilot project 323  
scholarship program is operating under sections 3313.974 to 324  
3313.979 of the Revised Code, the student is not eligible for an 325  
educational choice scholarship under section 3310.03 of the 326  
Revised Code, and the student's family income is at or below ~~two-~~ 327  
three hundred per cent of the federal poverty guidelines, as 328  
defined in section 5101.46 of the Revised Code. 329

(B) In each fiscal year for which the general assembly 330  
appropriates funds for purposes of this section, the department 331  
of education shall pay scholarships to attend chartered 332  
nonpublic schools in accordance with section 3310.08 of the 333  
Revised Code. The number of scholarships awarded under this 334  
section shall not exceed the number that can be funded with 335  
appropriations made by the general assembly for this purpose. 336

(C) Scholarships under this section shall be awarded as 337  
follows: 338

(1) For the 2013-2014 school year, to eligible students 339  
who are entering kindergarten in that school year for the first 340  
time; 341

(2) For each subsequent school year through the 2019-2020 342  
school year, scholarships shall be awarded to eligible students 343  
in the next grade level above the highest grade level awarded in 344  
the preceding school year, in addition to the grade levels for 345  
which students received scholarships in the preceding school 346  
year; 347

(3) Beginning with the 2020-2021 school year, to eligible 348  
students who are entering any of grades kindergarten through 349  
twelve in that school year for the first time. 350

(D) If the number of eligible students who apply for a 351  
scholarship under this section exceeds the scholarships 352  
available based on the appropriation for this section, the 353  
department shall award scholarships in the following order of 354  
priority: 355

(1) First, to eligible students who received scholarships 356  
under this section in the prior school year; 357

(2) Second, to eligible students with family incomes at or 358  
below one hundred per cent of the federal poverty guidelines. If 359  
the number of students described in division (D) (2) of this 360  
section who apply for a scholarship exceeds the number of 361  
available scholarships after awards are made under division (D) 362  
(1) of this section, the department shall select students 363  
described in division (D) (2) of this section by lot to receive 364  
any remaining scholarships. 365

(3) Third, to other eligible students who qualify under 366  
this section. If the number of students described in division 367

(D) (3) of this section exceeds the number of available 368  
scholarships after awards are made under divisions (D) (1) and 369  
(2) of this section, the department shall select students 370  
described in division (D) (3) of this section by lot to receive 371  
any remaining scholarships. 372

(E) Subject to divisions (E) (1) to (3) of this section, a 373  
student who receives a scholarship under this section remains an 374  
eligible student and may continue to receive scholarships under 375  
this section in subsequent school years until the student 376  
completes grade twelve, so long as the student satisfies the 377  
conditions specified in divisions (F) (2) and (3) of section 378  
3310.03 of the Revised Code. 379

Once a scholarship is awarded under this section, the 380  
student shall remain eligible for that scholarship for the 381  
current school year and subsequent school years even if the 382  
student's family income rises above the amount specified in 383  
division (A) of this section, provided the student remains 384  
enrolled in a chartered nonpublic school, however: 385

(1) If the student's family income is above ~~two~~ three 386  
hundred per cent but at or below three hundred fifty per cent of 387  
the federal poverty guidelines, the student shall receive a 388  
scholarship in the amount of seventy-five per cent of the full 389  
scholarship amount. 390

(2) If the student's family income is above three hundred 391  
fifty per cent but at or below four hundred per cent of the 392  
federal poverty guidelines, the student shall receive a 393  
scholarship in the amount of fifty per cent of the full 394  
scholarship amount. 395

(3) If the student's family income is above four hundred 396

per cent of the federal poverty guidelines, the student is no 397  
longer eligible to receive an educational choice scholarship. 398

Sec. 3310.033. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in 399  
Chapter 3310. of the Revised Code, the department of education 400  
shall not award a first-time scholarship to a student under 401  
section 3310.03 of the Revised Code for the 2020-2021, 2021- 402  
2022, or 2022-2023 school year if both of the following apply to 403  
the student: 404

(A) The student would be assigned under section 3319.01 of 405  
the Revised Code to a school building that satisfies either of 406  
the following conditions: 407

(1) The building receives an overall grade of "A," "B," or 408  
"C" on the report card issued under section 3302.03 of the 409  
Revised Code that is published prior to the first day of July of 410  
the school year for which the scholarship is sought. 411

(2) The building receives an overall grade of "D" on the 412  
report card issued under section 3302.03 of the Revised Code 413  
that is published prior to the first day of July of the school 414  
year for which the scholarship is sought; and the building was 415  
not ranked, for at least two of the three most recent rankings 416  
prior to the first day of July of the school year for which a 417  
scholarship is sought, in the lowest twenty per cent of all 418  
buildings operated by city, local, and exempted village school 419  
districts according to performance index score as determined by 420  
the department. 421

(B) The student's resident school district is not a 422  
district described in division (E) of section 3310.03 of the 423  
Revised Code. 424

Sec. 3333.16. (A) As used in this section—"state: 425

(1) "State institution of higher education" means an 426  
institution of higher education as defined in section 3345.12 of 427  
the Revised Code. 428

(2) "State university" has the same meaning as in section 429  
3345.011 of the Revised Code. 430

~~(A)~~ (B) The chancellor of higher education shall do all of 431  
the following: 432

(1) Establish policies and procedures applicable to all 433  
state institutions of higher education that ensure that students 434  
can begin higher education at any state institution of higher 435  
education and transfer coursework and degrees to any other state 436  
institution of higher education without unnecessary duplication 437  
or institutional barriers. The purpose of this requirement is to 438  
allow students to attain their highest educational aspirations 439  
in the most efficient and effective manner for the students and 440  
the state. These policies and procedures shall require state 441  
institutions of higher education to make changes or 442  
modifications, as needed, to strengthen course content so as to 443  
ensure equivalency for that course at any state institution of 444  
higher education. 445

(2) Develop and implement a universal course equivalency 446  
classification system for state institutions of higher education 447  
so that the transfer of students and the transfer and 448  
articulation of equivalent courses or specified learning modules 449  
or units completed by students are not inhibited by inconsistent 450  
judgment about the application of transfer credits. Coursework 451  
completed within such a system at one state institution of 452  
higher education and transferred to another institution shall be 453  
applied to the student's degree objective in the same manner as 454  
equivalent coursework completed at the receiving institution. 455



(3) Develop an electronic equivalency management tool to assist in the transfer of coursework and degrees between state institutions of higher education without unnecessary duplication or institutional barriers, to help minimize inconsistent judgment about the application of transfer credits, and to assist in allowing transfer credits to be applied to a student's degree objective in the same manner at each state institution of higher education. The electronic equivalency management tool shall include the universal documentation of course and program equivalencies statewide. Additionally, the electronic equivalency management tool shall be incorporated into a web site. 456  
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(4) Develop a system of transfer policies that ensure that graduates with associate degrees which include completion of approved transfer modules shall be admitted to a state institution of higher education, shall be able to compete for admission to specific programs on the same basis as students native to the institution, and shall have priority over out-of-state associate degree graduates and transfer students. To assist a student in advising and transferring, all state institutions of higher education shall fully implement the information system for advising and transferring selected by, contracted for, or developed by the chancellor. 468  
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~~(4)~~ (5) Examine the feasibility of developing a transfer marketing agenda that includes materials and interactive technology to inform the citizens of Ohio about the availability of transfer options at state institutions of higher education and to encourage adults to return to colleges and universities for additional education; 479

career colleges and schools, and in light of existing criteria 486  
and any other criteria developed by the articulation and 487
