BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That section 5.294 of the Revised Code be	3
enacted to read as follows:	4
Sec. 5.294. The month of April is designated as "Autism	5
Acceptance Month."	6
Section 2. Nationally, the first day of April is the	7
beginning of Autism Acceptance Month, which is the month during	8
which our nation recognizes all individuals around the world who	9
live on the autism spectrum. On the first day of April, and	10
every day, the General Assembly celebrates the numerous ways	11
autistic individuals enhance the quality of our communities and	12
enrich our world. As the General Assembly recognizes this	13

important day, the General Assembly reaffirms their fundamental rights to participate fully in society, be treated with dignity and respect, and fulfill their highest potential.

For decades, advocates have celebrated April as Autism

Awareness Month. Since 2008, the second day of April has been known as "Autism Awareness Day," a designation bestowed by the United Nations, in collaboration with leading disability organizations and millions of advocates across the globe. Now, more than ever, the General Assembly knows that the choice of our words matter and that unity and acceptance are foundational values to move our society forward. The General Assembly now acknowledges the need to advance our language. Awareness provides education and understanding. Acceptance is what is needed to inspire inclusion and systems-wide changes to achieve full participation within society. Thus, the General Assembly is proud to stand alongside the autism community by designating April as "Autism Acceptance Month" in section 5.294 of the Revised Code as enacted by this act.

In the United States, one in fifty-four children are diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder, totaling over five million young people and adults. These individuals are our classmates, colleagues, friends, and loved ones, and they greatly contribute their strengths, talents, and abilities to the community around them. Across the nation, people with autism are able to achieve independence and live purposeful lives when afforded the support system and opportunities that each and every one of us deserves.

As many individuals and families living with autism know,
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acceptance is often one of the biggest barriers to finding and
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developing a strong support system. Ohio understands the
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importance of fostering acceptance to lead to improved supports	44				
and to achieve equity in education, employment, housing, health	45				
care, and comprehensive long-term services and supports. Ohio	46

The General Assembly will continue to prioritize enacting	49
