A BILL

To enact sections 103.55, 103.551, and 103.552 of	1
the Revised Code to establish the Adverse	2
Childhood Experiences Study Commission.	3

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That sections 103.55, 103.551, and 103.552 of	4
the Revised Code be enacted to read as follows:	5
Sec. 103.55. (A) As used in this section and sections	6
103.551 and 103.552 of the Revised Code, "adverse childhood	7
experiences" are potentially traumatic events that occur in	8
childhood, including various forms of physical and emotional	9
abuse, neglect, and household dysfunction.	10
(B) There is hereby created the adverse childhood	11
experiences study commission. The commission shall:	12
(1) Gather data on adverse childhood experiences;	13
(2) Study the effects of adverse childhood experiences;	14
(3) Recommend legislative strategies to the general	15

assembly for addressing the prevalence and effects of adverse	16
childhood experiences.	17
(C) The commission shall consist of the following members:	18
(1) The following members appointed by the governor:	19
(a) One social worker or school counselor who has worked	20
with children experiencing violence, abuse, and neglect;	21
(b) One current or former law enforcement officer with	22
expertise in community violence;	23
(c) One representative from an organization that serves	24
adult suicide survivors;	25
(d) One individual who has earned a doctoral degree in a	26
social science field who is an expert on child suicide and	27
employed as a professor or researcher;	28
(e) One current or former judge of a municipal or common	29
pleas court;	30
(f) One individual authorized under Chapter 4732. of the	31
Revised Code to practice psychology;	32
(g) One individual authorized under Chapter 4732. of the	33
Revised Code to practice psychology who has experience treating	34
chemical dependency and substance abuse;	35
(h) One individual authorized under Chapter 4731. of the	36
Revised Code to practice medicine and surgery or osteopathic	37
medicine and surgery;	38
(i) One individual who has earned a doctoral degree in a	39
social science field who is an expert on family dynamics and	40
employed as a professor or researcher;	41
(j) One representative of the department of job and family	42

(k) One person who holds certification as a crisis	44
intervention specialist from a national credentialing	45
organization;	46
(1) One representative from the children's trust fund.	47
(2) Two members of the senate, one from the majority party	48
and one from the minority party, both appointed by the president	49
of the senate;	50
(3) Two members of the house of representatives, one from	51
the majority party and one from the minority party, both	52
appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives.	53
(D) Not later than sixty days after the effective date of	54
this section, initial appointments shall be made to the	55
commission. Thereafter, appointments shall be made within thirty	56
days of a vacancy in the commission. Following the commencement	57
of a new general assembly, the president of the senate and the	58
speaker of the house of representatives shall make new	59
appointments to the commission.	60
(E) In odd-numbered years, the commission shall designate	61
by majority vote one commission member from the senate as the	62
commission chairperson, and one commission member from the house	63
of representatives as the vice-chairperson. In even-numbered	64
years, the commission shall designate by majority vote one	65
commission member from the house of representatives as the	66
commission chairperson, and one commission member from the	67
senate as the vice-chairperson.	68
(F) Members shall serve without compensation except to the	69
extent that serving on the commission is considered part of the	70
member's regular duties of employment. The commission shall	71

reimburse each member for actual and necessary expenses incurred	72
in the performance of the member's official duties.	73
(G) A majority of the members constitutes a quorum for the	74
conduct of meetings. The commission shall comply with public	75
records and open meetings requirements as described in sections	76
121.22 and 149.43 of the Revised Code.	77
(H) The commission shall abide by rules governing the	78
senate and the house of representatives that pertain to decorum.	79
(I) The general assembly shall provide meeting space,	80
staff services, and other technical assistance required by the	81
commission in carrying out its duties.	82
Sec. 103.551. (A) The adverse childhood experiences study	83
commission shall hold its first meeting not more than sixty days	84
after initial appointments are made. Thereafter, the commission	85
shall meet once quarterly.	86
(B) The first meeting of each calendar year shall be an	87
organizational meeting to elect a chairperson and vice-	88
chairperson, and set a calendar for the remainder of the year.	89
(C) During one meeting each year, each member appointed by	90
the governor shall present to the commission information	91
relevant to the member's area of expertise, including	92
suggestions for legislative approaches to address the prevalence	93
and effects of adverse childhood experiences.	94
Sec. 103.552. (A) The adverse childhood experiences study	95
commission shall prepare an annual report summarizing the	96
following:	97
(1) Information and data collected by the commission	98
regarding the prevalence and effects of adverse childhood	99

(2) Possible legislative strategies for addressing the	
prevalence and effects of adverse childhood experiences.	
(B) The commission shall submit a copy of each report to	
the general assembly. The report shall be submitted in	
accordance with section 101.68 of the Revised Code.	
(C) The initial report shall be submitted not later than	
one year after the effective date of this section, and annually	
<u>thereafter.</u>	
(D) On submission of its fourth report, the commission	
shall cease to exist.
