BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That sections 103.55, 103.551, and 103.552 of	4

experiences" are potentially traumatic events that occur in	8
childhood, including various forms of physical and emotional	9

(B) The adverse childhood experiences study commission is	12
created. The commission shall recommend legislative strategies	13
to the general assembly for addressing the prevalence and	14
effects of adverse childhood experiences.	15

suggestions for legislative approaches to address the prevalence	104

Sec. 103.552. (A) The adverse childhood experiences study	106	
commission shall prepare an annual report summarizing possible	107

(B) The commission shall submit a copy of each report to	110	
the general assembly. The report shall be submitted in	111
